## Shepherding the Flock & Clothing Ourselves with Humility

## **1. Peter's Apostolic Exhortation**

• to the elders as a fellow elder

• as a witness of Christ's sufferings

• as a partaker in the glory that is going to be revealed

## 2. Shepherd the flock of God

- exercising oversight
- not under compulsion, but willingly
- not for shameful gain, but eagerly
- not domineering, but as examples
- receiving the unfading crown of glory when the chief Shepherd appears
- 3. The Call to Humility for Us All
- clothe yourselves, all of you, with humility toward one another

• for "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble"

## Leadership & Shepherding Language Used in the New Testament

The words elder, overseer, shepherd, flock & sheep are often used in connection with one another, & sometimes even interchangeably (e.g., elders/overseers in Ac 20:17,28; 1Ti 3:1-2; 5:17). Here are some examples of how these words are used by NT authors (color coded for easy reference). Scripture taken from the ESV © 2001.

Shepherd(s) (poimēn) – John 10:11; Ephesians 4:11; 1 Peter 2:25
Chief Shepherd (archipoimēn) – 1 Peter 5:4
Shepherd [verb] (poimainō) – John 21:16 [tend]; Acts 2:28 [to care for]; 1 Peter 5:2
Flock (poimnion) – Acts 2:28; 1 Peter 5:2-3
Sheep (probaton) – John 10:11; 21:16-17; 1 Peter 2:25

Elders (*presbyteros*) – Acts 20:17; 1 Timothy 5:17,19; 1 Peter 5:1 A fellow elder (*synpresbyteros*) – 1 Peter 5:1

**Oversight** (*episkopeō*) – 1 Peter 5:2 **Overseer** (*episkopos*) – Acts 20:28; 1 Timothy 3:2 **Office of Overseer** (*episkopē*) – 1 Timothy 3:1

John 10:11 <sup>11</sup> I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. John 21:16b He said to him, "Tend [shepherd] my sheep." [see also v17]

Acts 20:17-18, 28 <sup>17</sup> Now from Miletus he sent to Ephesus and called the elders of the church to come to him. <sup>18</sup> And when they came to him, he said to them ... <sup>28</sup> Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for [shepherd] the church of God, <sup>[g]</sup> which he obtained with his own blood. <sup>[f]</sup>

**Ephesians 4:11-12** <sup>11</sup> And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds [<sup>c</sup> or pastors] and teachers [<sup>d</sup> or the shepherd-teachers], <sup>12</sup> to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ,

**1 Peter 2:25** <sup>25</sup> For you were straying like sheep, but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls.

**1 Peter 5:1-4** So I exhort the **elders** among you, as **a fellow elder** and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, as well as a partaker in the glory that is going to be revealed: <sup>2</sup> shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising **oversight**, <sup>[a]</sup> ... being examples to the flock. <sup>4</sup> And when the chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the unfading crown of glory.

**1 Timothy 3:1** The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the **office of overseer**, he desires a noble task. <sup>2</sup> Therefore an **overseer**<sup>[a]</sup> must be above reproach...

**1 Timothy 5:17** <sup>17</sup> Let the **elders** who rule well be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in preaching and teaching. [see also v19]
